

Consider a Family Meeting To Discuss Estate Plans

Access To Winter Water Is Important By: Jeff Burbrink, Purdue Extension

upon us. While it's easy to think about how miserable it is for us humans, just remember our livestock and pets need water and shelter too. Water is critical to the survival of all outdoor animals, whether the temperature is 100 °F or 0 °F.

The water needs of animals during the winter depends on the animal size, their level of activity and whether they are lactating. The average size horse drinks 10-12 gallons of water per day. Draft horses may drink up to 15-20 gallons of water a day. A lactating beef cow may require 12 gallons of water, while a lactating dairy cow may need 35-45 gallons of water per day. Lactating sheep and goats need three gallons of water per day.

A heated water bucket, a heater in water troughs and a heated automatic waterer are options to provide unfrozen water. Without heaters, make sure the ice is broken on the water supply. You could encourage the animals to drink by providing lukewarm water or water between 40 °F and 60 °F.

A few years ago, I spoke to a person whose horses stopped drinking water, even with an electric water heater in the trough. He said when he placed his hand in the water trough, it felt fine, but the horses refused to drink. However, when he brought them water in a bucket, they drank freely. Most likely, the old water heater he was using released a small current that the horses felt but it was

The cold winter blast is finally not enough to sense with his own hand. He replaced the heater and the horses started drinking again. Dairy cows, too, are very sensitive to small amounts of stray voltage that you and I cannot feel. Careful observation of the drinking habits of the animals is the best way to discover these issues.

> Winter hydration is important for people too. One sign of dehydration in people is an inability to detect thirst, and cold weather affects that sense. The average person should consume the equivalent of 10-13 cups of water daily, along with the water that is in your food. People who work outdoors, have physical jobs, or work out in the gym will have higher requirements.

> Don't forget about your water supply. In buildings lacking insulation, it is common to have pipes freeze when temperatures approach single digits. Pipes located near exterior walls are most vulnerable. Opening cabinet doors to let heat in, or allowing the faucet to trickle when temperatures are dropping are two techniques that can help.

> Heat tape, when installed properly, can help with situations in homes and barns. However, safety must be at the top of your mind. The Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates there are 2000 heat tape related fires each year, resulting in 10 deaths in the US. They recommend replacing heat tapes more than three years old with new tape, and using only heat tapes with grounded three prong plugs. 🚺



The Strange Evolution From Honoring a

Martyr to Wooing Your Sweetheart

Growing up giving your classmates valentines on Valentine's Day as a thirdgrade boy was pretty much, "Gee Mom, do I have to?" By the time seventh and eighth grade rolled around it was, "Ok, everybody in my class in school gets the cheap corny ones, but for this one girl..." And then came the high school years.

Now, you are expected to buy your girlfriend flowers and a heartshaped box of chocolates. Of course, we didn't mind too much because you were "in love" and you didn't want to come across as an insensitive, uncaring cheapskate. But who came up with this idea of valentines, chocolate, flowers, and an evening out at some overpriced restaurant anyway!? Has all this hoopla over Valentine's Day just been a Hallmark invention to find a way to make men buy cheesy sentimental cards that get read maybe once before ending up in some box in the basement or closet where they will never again see the light of day? Whose idea was this!?

Ok, have I got your attention, or have you stopped reading? For the record, I like Valentine's Day! I like buying gifts for my wife. I like taking her out to a nice restaurant for dinner. Truth be told, I may be (I'm protecting myself here) more of a romantic than my wife Janice. After all, she has put up with me for going on 56 years.

is a fascinating story. What began as a day to honor the memory of a Christian martyr in the 14th century has evolved into a major commercial holiday. It is estimated that every year, Americans spend more than \$20 billion on Valentine's Day cards, gifts, and romantic dinners.

One of the legends associated with St. Valentine is that he performed secret marriages in spite of the fact that Emperor Claudius II had outlawed

the practice. Claudius believed that single men made better soldiers. I found another legend claiming that the imprisoned and smitten Valentine sent a letter to his jailer's daughter which he signed "From your Valentine." Who really knows? But you have to admit that it makes for a great story.

There are conflicting claims regarding who was the real St. Valentine. According to the official biography of the Diocese of Terni, Bishop Valentine was born in 226 AD in Terni, Italy, and lived in Interamna. While on a "temporary" stay in Rome he was imprisoned, tortured, and martyred there February 14, 269. His body was hastily buried at a nearby cemetery and a few nights later, his disciples retrieved his body and returned him to his home. It is worth noting that members of the Eastern Orthodox Church celebrate on July 6 rather than on February 14.

It is the English poet Geoffrey Chaucer, who had nothing to do with the 3rd century martyr, that we have to thank for linking romance to the day of remembrance. Chaucer is best known for his The Tales of Canterberry. Literary scholars point to Chaucer's Parlement of Foules as one of the earliest known writings to associate lovers with Valentine's Day. Websites like Wikipedia suggest that Chaucer most The history of Valentine's Day likely started writing the poem in late 1382 in time for its release on February 14, 1383.

> The 699 lines of the poem tells the story of three male eagles who vie for the love of a single female. Some have suggested that it was written to honor the grand marriage of King Richard II of England to Anne of Bohemia which was only consummated after five years of negotiations. Chaucer appears to have used poetic license to invent the romance associated with our

modern holiday.

In the poem, the female eagle refuses to choose any of her suitors. Instead, she asks Mother Nature to give her a year to decide. Her wish is granted, and Mother Nature comforts the three suitors by saying, "A year is not too long to endure." The poem expresses an idealized version of love in the Middle Ages and the increasing power of women in the affairs of the heart.

Shortly following the release of Chaucer's poem, real life lovers began sending each other love poems on February 14. While Chaucer's poem was written more than 600 years ago, its message still resonates today with lovers young and old alike. Take for example the opening lines of his poem:

"So short our lives, so hard the lessons, so difficult the test, so sudden the final victory, so tenuous the hope of joy that so easily evaporates into fear—this is what I mean by Love."

Then again, for those of us in northeastern Indiana, this is probably not how we would express it but you get the picture.

The celebration of Valentine's Day began its rise to new heights of popularity following World War II. The war was over, and husbands and lovers had come home. Romance was in the air—shortly to be followed by the generation known as Baby Boomers.

My first memories of Valentine's Day go back to when I was a third grader living in Oregon with my grandparents. It was a rather conservative Mennonite home, but back then almost everyone was conservative even if you were on the other side of the political aisle.

My grandmother bought us valentines to give to our classmates at Price School, the two-room public school I attended with my two uncles. But there was a problem! The valentines had words on them like "Dang," "Doggone," and "Darn" which we were not allowed to say because they were substitute swear words.

Mama's (which is what I call my grandmother) solution was to pull out the Scotch tape and use a piece of tape to lift off the offensive words. The valentines didn't look the greatest, but our spiritual integrity was preserved. Besides, if you were a third-grade boy back in 1955, who really cared!
