

school record, the Sectional record, and tied the Meadow Valley Golf course record with a score of 63, which is 9 below par! Incredible work!












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

## LaGrange County Community Foundation awards \$70,000 in Community Impact Grants

The LaGrange County Community Foundation has awarded \$70,000 to seven local nonprofits through the spring cycle of its Community Impact Grants Program. These grants support programs and services that improve the quality of life in LaGrange County.

The largest grant—\$25,000—was awarded to the LaGrange County Council on Aging for the construction of a new garage to house vehicles for its LaGrange County Area Transit (LCAT) program. The garage will protect the fleet from weather, extend the life of the vehicles, and improve service reliability. LCAT is the county's only public rural transportation provider, helping residents—especially seniors—get to medical appointments, work, and essential services both in and outside of the county.

"The need for a new garage is critical to maintaining and expanding the transportation services that many La-Grange County residents rely on for their daily needs," said Cheri Perkins, LaGrange COA Executive Director. "Community support through donations and advocacy is essential to the success of this program."

Ark Animal Rescue and Adoption Center received \$20,000 for its Bark at the Ark Barn Initiative, a meet-and-greet space for adoptive families and rescue animals. The barn will also be used for youth programs and community outreach. A no-kill shelter, Ark rehomed 700 animals in 2024 and provides animal control services throughout the county.

"Through community support and all of our programs, Ark Animal Rescue fosters a compassionate community dedicated to the well-being of animals,"

said Jill Hostetler, Interim Executive Director of Ark Animal Rescue.

LaGrange County Hope was awarded \$10,000 to expand its youth food delivery program, which provides weekly meal packs—including fresh and cold items—to nearly 450 children across all three LaGrange County school districts.

"There are so many ways to contribute to this vital program," said Sonja Giggy, President of LaGrange County Hope. "Whether it's a monetary gift, donating food, or helping pack meals, we can all make a difference."

Additional grants include:

· Cancer Services of Northeast Indiana

- \$5,000 for client advocacy and support in LaGrange County
- Community Harvest Food Bank \$1,500 to support the Farm Wagon mobile pantry
- Fort Wayne Philharmonic Orchestra –
   \$5,000 for music education programs and live ensemble performances in local schools
- McMillen Health \$3,500 for preventative health education programs for LaGrange County youth

These grants are made possible by generous donors who support the Foundation's unrestricted and field-of-interest funds. Contributions to the Caring Community Fund are currently matched 2-to-1 through Lilly Endowment's GIFT VIII Initiative, tripling the impact of every gift through December 31, 2025. A \$100 donation becomes \$300 for community grantmaking.

Donors can also create a named unrestricted fund to support future community grants. A new fund can be started with a gift of \$3,500 and matched to reach the \$10,000 minimum for a permanent endowment. The Foundation has until December 31, 2025, to raise \$262,500 in eligible gifts to unlock the full match.

"Our Community Impact Grants reflect the passion of local nonprofits and the generosity of donors who care deeply about LaGrange County," said Octavia Yoder, Executive Director of the Foundation. "It's inspiring to see these investments at work—supporting neighbors, empowering youth, and strengthening families. With the matching opportunity, it's a powerful time to invest in the future of our community."

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





## Community Scholarships Provide \$254,000 in Support for Students




#### **NECC Tournament**




## 2X State Champion

Congratulations to two-time state champion Noah Bontrager. Noah won both the 1600 meter race and the 3200 meter race a mere 90 minutes apart. Noah's time of 4:02.60 was also fast enough to set the state meet record and a Westview School record. He also set school records in the 3200 meter run and the 400 meter dash this season. "He's a once-in-a-lifetime runner we'll probably never see at Westview again," remarked Coach Matt Jones.

As of this writing, Noah was headed to

Philadelphia to compete in the New Balance Nationals in the 5000 meter run. Noah will compete again in cross country and track as a senior next year. Beyond high school, Noah is committed to continue his running career at the University of Notre Dame where he plans to study pre-med. Says Noah, "This has been my favorite season by far because of the people I'm surrounded with making the running experience better. I will never forget the great people and experiences I have had this year!"



Hear the name "Disney" and you immediately think of Walt Disney, the creator of the television series entitled the Wonderful World of Disney and the world-famous Disney theme parks. But Newberry Township and the community of Eddy, five miles east of Topeka, was home to another Disney family who are fascinating in their own right. Were they related to Walt Disney? Well, at this point we just don't know.

What we do know is that the Disneys who lived in this area trace their ancestry back to Revolutionary War Captain James Disney (1755-1827). Capt. Disney was born in All Hallows PARISH, Anne Arundel, Maryland, to Richard and Elizabeth Guinn Disney. Around 1773, he married Rachel Pick-

ett. They would become parents to at least 5 sons and 3 daughters. One of those sons was Coven Disney (1781-1850). James died in 1827 at the age of 72 and was buried in the Disney Cemetery in Anne Arundel, Maryland.

Coven and his son, William (1816-1858), found their way to Newberry Township. We are not sure when they settled in this area, but their names appear in the 1850 U.S. Census. William married Eunice Poynter (1825-1913) on September 27, 1852, here in LaGrange County. Unfortunately, William would die at the age of only 37, but William and Eunice would have three children. Their daughter Mary (Pierson) was born in 1853. Two years later George was born and two years after George they welcomed William Alex-

ander (1857-1921).

William Alexander Disney (Find a Grave #60085386) married Rose Reinhart. They had several children, one of whom was Pearl Eunice (1883-1951). Pearl married John Dillion. There are many in the Shipshewana area who will remember their son Robert Dillion who was a member of the Shipshewana Methodist Church and a regular for breakfast at Marner's Six Mile Café.

It was George (Find a Grave #36439752) who found his way to Eddy five miles east of Topeka. On February 13, 1879, George married Matilda Hodge (1863-1912) the daughter of George and Elizebeth Hodge. Tragedy struck when their first child, a girl, died in early 1883 only seven days after birth. While not named, she was buried in the Beaulah Cemetery north

and east of Topeka. In the years that followed they would welcome Leonard (1884), Russell (1893), Blanch Mae (1895), Opal Ella (1898), Hazel Helen (1901), and Roy Murrell (1905) into their home.

The 1900 U.S. Census records George, Matilda and four children living in Clearspring Township, five miles east of Topeka. George is listed as being a farmer. I have not been able to discover how much land he owned, but he did own the farm without any debt.

Matilda Disney died at 8:15 on Thursday evening June 13, 1913, from a pulmonary thrombosis. Dr. Vaughn from Topeka signed the death certificate. Services were held at Green Chapel with burial in the cemetery across the road from the church.

Whether it was his mother Matilda's death that started Russell's downward spiral we will never know. But on August 10, 1912, he married Elizabeth Katherine Dorrier (1892-1968) in Paw Paw, Michigan. That marriage would not endure. On July 27th of 1920, The South Bend Tribune (page 2) published an announcement that Russell had filed for divorce on the grounds of abandonment. The article read: "The petition states that the couple was married at Paw Paw, Mich. Aug. 10, 1912, and that the wife abandoned her husband at Glenwood, Mich. in June, 1914." Legal notices were published on July 31, August 7, and August 14, 1920.

Most likely the divorce proceedings did not take place until 1920 because of Russell's prior legal problems. The Topeka Journal (February 3, 1916) reported on his arrest. Here is the page 4 story as it appeared. "Russell Disney, 22 years old, of near Eddy, was arrest Saturday evening by Sheriff Charles

Russel Disney residing about four miles east of Topeka was arraigned before Justice Minnich at Lagrange, Monday, charged with rape, pleaded guilty and was held to the Lagrange circuit court under \$2,000 bond. Young Disney is also charged with breaking into the W. C. Strang barn with felonious intent he being under bond on this charge.

Russel Disney, 23 years old, was arraigned in Lagrange Circuit Court Tuesday, charged with rape, and on his plea of guilty was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 and serve from one to twenty-one years at the Indiana state reformatory. Disney also has a charge of burglary hanging over him. Bert Trittipo was arraigned in circuit court Tuesday charged with larceny, and on his plea of not guilty, his trial was set for a later date and his bond was fixed at \$500.

Even more disturbing were the charges of rape that were brought against him the following April. The April 13th Topeka Journal reported that once again, Disney appeared before Justice Minnich. Russell pled guilty to

the rape charge and was held over to Circuit Court under at \$2,000 bond. No mention of the identity of rape victim was found in the newspaper.


On April 27, 1916, the Topeka Journal reported that Disney's guilty plea to the rape charge had been entered the previous Tuesday in Lagrange Circuit Court. Disney was fined \$500 and sentenced to serve one to twenty-one years in the Indiana State Reformatory.

From Russell's 1917 World War I draft card we learn some interesting facts, plus we have his actual signature. The draft card says that he was single, but in fact he was still legally married. It also says that he was an inmate in Jeffersonville, Indiana. He was listed as being "short" and "stout" with gray eyes and brown hair.

It is not known when he was released from prison. We presume that he was out of prison when he filed for a divorce from his wife Elizabeth in July of 1920. On September 21, 1922, he married Lillian "Lillie" Myers who was 22 years his elder. Lillie died on February 11, 1929, and was buried in the East Springfield United Methodist Cemetery.

Russell made his way to South Bend where his sister Opal was living. He would spend the last 32 years of his life in South Bend working at Hill's Restaurant on East Jefferson Boulevard. At 9 o'clock Monday morning December 1, 1946, he was discovered dead in his bed at 418 ½ South Michigan Street. His obituary and death certificate state that he had been suffering with a heart ailment for over a year.

Russell's next younger sister Blanche Mae (1895-1958) married Grant Anderson (1890-1962) in 1931. Following Blanche's death in 1958,



#### PLAN RITES FOR TOPEKA FARMER

The Tribune's Special Service. ELKHART, Ind., Oct. 4.—Funeral services for George Disney, age 75, a farmer living five miles east of Topeka, Ind., who died Friday night in Elkhart General hospital, will be held at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon in Green's chapel, east of Topeka. Mr. Disney is survived by four sons, Leonard Disney, of Libertyville, Ill., Gene and Merle Disney of South Bend, and Russell Disney, of Lagrange, Ind., and three daughters, Mrs. Opal Eisenblotzer, of South Bend, Miss Blanche Disney of Mishawaka, and Mrs. Raphael Vaughn, of Topeka.

Grant married her younger sister Hazel (1901-1993) who's first two husbands had both died. Hazel Disney Vaughn Strang Anderson is buried in the Eden Cemetery west of Topeka.

George Disney died on October 3,

1930, in the Elkhart General Hospital. The death certificate gives the cause death as a hemorrhage from cancer of the bladder. It also lists his date of birth, not 1855, but as January 12, 1856. Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon October 5th at Green Chapel five miles east of Topeka. He was laid to rest in the Lakeside Cemetery (across from Green Chapel) next to his wife Matilda.
