
### MISS KAYLEE KAUFFMAN





### **COLA** is Sweet for Social Security Recipients

If you receive Social Security, you've probably already heard that your checks in 2023 will be bigger – considerably bigger, in fact. How can you make the best use of this extra money?

Here's what's happening: For 2023, there's an 8.7% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for Social Security benefits – the largest increase in 40 years. Also, the monthly Medicare Part B premiums are declining next year, to \$164.90/month from \$170.10/month, which will also modestly

boost Social Security checks for those enrolled in Part B, as these premiums are automatically deducted.

Of course, the sizable COLA is due to the high inflation of 2022, as the Social Security Administration uses a formula based on increases in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). So, it's certainly possible that you will need some, or perhaps all, of your larger checks to pay for the increased cost of goods and services. But if your cash flow is already relatively strong, you might want to consider these suggestions for using your bigger checks:

• Reduce withdrawals from your investment portfolio. When you're retired, you will likely need to withdraw a certain amount from your portfolio each year to meet your expenses. A boost in your Social Security may enable you to withdraw less, at least for

a year. This can be particularly advantageous when the markets are down, as you'd like to avoid, as much as possible, selling investments and withdrawing the money when investment prices are



low. And the fewer investments you need to sell, the longer your portfolio may last during your retirement years.

• Help build your cash reserves. When you're retired, it's a good idea to maintain about a year's worth of the amount you'll spend from your portfolio in cash, while also keeping three months' of your spending needs in an emergency fund, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account. Your higher Social Security checks could help you build these cash reserves. (Also, it's helpful to keep another three to five years' worth of spending from your portfolio in short-term, fixed-income investments, which now, due to higher interest rates, offer better income opportunities.)

• Contribute to a 529 plan. You could use some of your extra Social Security money to contribute to a tax-advantaged 529 education savings

plan for your grandchildren or other family members.

• Contribute to charitable organizations. You might want to use some of your Social Security money to expand

your charitable giving. Your generosity will help worthy groups and possibly bring you some tax benefits, too.

While it's nice to have these possible options in 2023, you can't count on future COLA increases being as large. The jump in inflation in 2022 was due to several unusual

factors, including pandemic-related government spending, supply shortages and the Russian invasion of Ukraine. It's quite possible, perhaps even likely, that inflation will subside in 2023, which, in turn, would mean a smaller COLA bump in 2024.

Nonetheless, while you might not want to include large annual COLA increases as part of your long-term financial strategy, you may well choose to take advantage, in some of the ways described above, of the bigger Social Security checks you'll receive in 2023. When opportunity knocks, you may want to open the door.





Alumni include players from 1970s to 2021 and former coaches. There will also be a 50/50 raffle, full concession, and 3-point shooting.



Howe, Indiana.

If you've visited Pine Knob Park before, you will have experienced the many boardwalk sections through the marsh and wetlands of the park. This new trail requires the same and DeWald is pleased to report that the boardwalk portions have been built. 

# Free Sugar, Free Entertainment and Gold Buss

name of the winner. And if you were one of the lucky ones, you went home with 5 pounds of sugar and a 5-pound canned ham or, depending on the time of year, perhaps a turkey. When I was a kid, everyone showed up for the 5 o'clock drawing. Besides, there weren't a lot of other entertainment options on Saturdays in the 1950s.

Saturday evening drawings were a part of life in small communities for years. Business promotions and announcements were a regular feature in The Topeka Journal going back to the early years of the Great Depression. Surviving in business was hard in small towns like Shipshewana and Topeka during those years, so local businessmen had to become creative. Fortunately for businesses in small towns, they were the only option available to the local citizenry. Unfortunately, very few people had money to spend.

Just when Topeka merchants decided to forego competition with each other and join forces to boost local sales isn't clear. But desperate times call for desperate measures. The frontpage headline in the May 18, 1933, edition of The Topeka Journal announced the news, "Free Sugar and Free Enter-

tainment." However, the article didn't say when the drawing would take place. We know from later newspaper articles that the drawings in the 1930s took place at 9 pm on Saturday evenings when many people came to town to shop. Given all the shortages during the Great Depression and later with rationing during World War II, the chance to win a bag of free sugar would have been more than enticing.

The entertainment that evening in 1933 was the "Three Knights of the Road" with their Spanish guitars presenting a program of popular and old-time favorites. The news items noted that the entertainers could be heard every Saturday night at 6:15 Central Standard Time on WTRC (Elkhart). Parents were also to "warn the children to be quiet during the program or they will not be allowed to stand around the platform." So, they set up a platform ... but where?

In April of 1938, more than 20 places of business in Topeka joined forces with a unique "Gold Bug" promotion that culminated with a 9 pm public auction on Saturday night, April 30th. The only medium of exchange at the auction was the "Gold Bugs."

Regrettably we have no idea what these

It was a once-a-month Saturday evening affair when I was a kid. The town folks filled the four-way stop, and traffic, such as it was, came to a halt. Mom and Dad hurried into as many of the local stores as they could to sign up for more chances to win. It was time for the "weekly drawing." Names were drawn and a man with a giant silver colored megaphone bellowed out the

"Gold Bugs" looked like. A "Gold Bug" was given to customers by the participating merchants for each 25 cents spent on purchases up to \$25.00. That amounted to four "Gold Bugs" for every dollar spent. The items to be auctioned were donated by the merchants or their wholesalers.

Evidently the promotion proved to be a great success, because the paper for Thursday, June 30, 1938, ran a front-page, full-length, article announcing, "Gold Bugs" Come Again. William E. Miller (Miller's Cash Grocery) chairman, Ira E. Smith, and Robert M. Waddell, members of the committee, announced a long list of merchandise to be auctioned. There were three pairs of ladies' silk hose, three men's work shirts, 10 loaves of bread, and five 5-pound sacks of flour all donated by Ira Smith. Miller's Cash Grocery contributed a 6-pound bag of Moser cleaner, four packages of Royal gelatine, and a sack of Pillsbury flour. Seagly & Son donated a gallon of barn paint, 9 pounds of coffee, five rings of Eckrich bologna, and a slab of Seagly bacon. Leming's Restaurant added 12 pairs of silk stockings, six cans of tomato juice and box crackers. There

were two dozen boxes of shredded wheat, three quarts of orange pop, and

three bricks of ice cream from Martin's Café. Mrs. Buhl at the Topeka Hotel added three cans of corn and two cans of beans. Topeka Hardware donated a 9-by-12 linoleum rug and two sets of bathroom fixtures.

The Greenawalt Brothers, who had a

furniture store and who were the local undertakers, donated a 27-by-54 inch rug. Other merchants also contributed packages of bacon, ring bologna, fancy stationery, paint, and hog feed. Yes, hog feed! But the most interesting item came from L. E. Neufer who sold appliances, Philco radios, and electric fences. The article read, "Half interest in new Philco radio \$16.25." What was

the \$16.25 about? We are only left to wonder and try to imagine how owning

a half share of a radio would have worked.

Another sponsor was Gohn Brothers who were still new to Hawpatch. The March 28, 1935, edition of The Topeka Journal (page 5) announced the opening of their new "madeto-measure" clothing store. "We are showing all wool worsteds at \$16.85 and \$19.75 made to your measure." Dry cleaning and pressing was 50 cents for a suit or dress, or three items for \$1.25. They


also did clock and watch repairs.

The (1938) auction was set for Saturday, July 2nd, at 9 pm, which seems rather late by modern standards. A concert by The Wainwright Band (Jack Wainwright established the first nationally known band camp at Oliver Lake) was to follow. The Topeka Journal readers were encouraged to "Buy what you need in Topeka business places and be ready for the "Gold Bug" auction this coming Saturday, our Independence Day celebration."

Sadly, with the passing of time, the Saturday evening drawings gave way to other forms of promotions. Topeka merchants still sponsor a Wednesday night sale several times a year, but for many of us the nostalgic memories of those Saturday night drawings still linger.
