
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# sports





### Having Courage Despite Obstacles

It takes courage to live outside your comfort zone, to be yourself in a world where everyone tries to copy each other. But something amazing happens when you take the risk to do so. When you do this, you build momentum. Being yourself gets easier. You receive joy from it.

Being yourself can be a struggle, though. Not everyone will "get" you. People might talk about you. You might be misunderstood. What will you do then? Will you lie down in despair or will you get up and try again? A wrestler takes many hits, but it's when he *stays* down that he loses. The Bible talks about an evil man falling and staying down, but a righteous man who falls seven times gets up again (Proverbs 24:16). Let that be you!

Being yourself also involves growing personally and setting goals. When you go after goals, you might face resistance. Some resistance may come from people who don't want you to succeed. It's like a bucket full of crabs. One of the crabs becomes adventurous and starts crawling up the side of the bucket, headed for a better life. But the other crabs have something in their nature that makes them reach up and pull him back down.

There may be people who oppose your goals or personal growth because of jealousy, fear, or their own insecurities. Instead of letting them pull you down, be confident in who God made you to be. Trust God more than you fear what others think of you.

Often, however, the most dangerous resistance in growing or being yourself comes from inside of you. We all have fears, insecurities, and doubt. Stepping out of what's comfortable you're able to handle the situation better than you thought you could. It takes courage to step out of your comfort zones and do new things. Each time you do something new, you're less afraid.

When you overcome fear, you develop perseverance, problem solving, and resilience. You also lead those around you, because people see your perseverance. Did you set a few goals at the beginning of 2020? Don't throw them away. List one or two steps to achieve them. Ask God for wisdom, and walk forward, even if you're afraid.

Psalm 23:5-6 says God "prepares a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely goodness and mercy will follow me all the days of my life."

Life can be like a lavishly set table just out of reach. You find crumbs on the floor and believe it's the best there is. Or you can take a risk and crawl up on the table and find joy. Will you consider that God has good things for you, even if you haven't seen good things in the recent past?

God has good things for you, even in adversity. Just take the courageous step to come to the table! ①






Keeping a Healthy Heart

- Exercise 30 minutes a day, most days of the week. Walking, biking and strength training help lower weight, blood pressure, blood sugar and cholesterol levels.
- Eat healthier. Fruits and vegetables are great foods to substitute for junk food, such as chips, candy and desserts. Cutting portion sizes in half and avoiding deep fried foods like fries and breaded meats help with weight control. Work on your eating a little at a time and you will find success.
- Quit smoking! The risk of heart disease decreases by 50% after one year of successfully quitting smoking. Don't stop trying to quit, as it often takes multiple tries to succeed. If you need help quitting, talk to your doctor or call Quit Now Indiana at 1-800-**QUIT**-NOW for no cost help.

Give us a call at (260) 499-4182 extension 1 to schedule your appointment or to check status of recommended immunizations.

## Why vaccinate? - We vaccinate to protect our future.

Immunizations play an important part in the steps to erasing diseases, such as small pox. The polio virus vaccine has eradicated 99% of polio worldwide (now left in a few countries).

We do not vaccinate just to protect our children. We also vaccinate to protect our grandchildren and their grandchildren. Our children don't have to get smallpox shots anymore because the disease no longer exists. **Smallpox is now only** *a memory.* 

Immunizations prevent illness, disability, and death from preventable diseases such as cervical cancer, diphtheria, hepatitis B, measles, mumps, pertussis (whooping cough), pneumonia, polio, rotavirus diarrhea, rubella, and tetanus. Immunizations currently stop an estimated 2-3 million deaths worldwide every year from diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, and measles. The LaGrange County Health Department's Immunization Improvement Program is focus on continued care for our county's children and families. We provide immunization clinics for scheduled appointments in the LaGrange office on Monday and Tuesday, and walk-ins on Wednesday, as well as off-site clinics in Topeka Shipshewana alternating weeks on and Thursdays. Outreach clinics have also been scheduled in the Wolcottville area. The staff is committed to continually reach out to the community to provide other off-site clinics. If you are interested in hosting a clinic, please contact the LaGrange County Health Department at (260) 499-4182, extension #1.

#### What if we stopped vaccinating?

Diseases that are almost unknown would stage a comeback. For example, if we stopped immunizations, measles would increase to prevaccine levels, and 2.7 million measles deaths worldwide could be expected.

# "CAN I GET AN AMEN?"

But, was it the Sermon or the Sweet Cream?

#### Helestah antike Marcide Alle V

Sometimes the funniest things happen in church. Craig Helman shared one of those hilarious moments with Maggie Glick who included it in "Celebrating a Century 1893-1993," published by the Topeka Area Historical Society. It involved Craig's great, great grandfather John Shover Ramsby, whose sweet cream hair tonic made for an interesting Sunday morning service at Eden Chapel. But first, a little family history will be helpful.

It was in October of 1834, Mrs. Elizabeth (Stevens) Ramsby (1789-1869), the widow of John H. Ramsby (1772-1830), came from Ohio with her five sons and two daughters settling on land in Section 27 of Eden Township (2 miles west and a half mile north of Topeka on what is now the west side of State Road 5). John Ramsby was

born in Germany on February 29, 1772. Exactly when he immigrated to America is not clear. However, genealogy records on Family Search website indicate that he married Elizabeth Stevens in 1807 in Hawkins, Ohio, Their oldest daughter Mahala (1812-1880) was born in Ross County, Ohio, in January of 1812. John died on May 18, 1830, in Hocking, Ohio. In October of that same year, Mahala married John Hostetter (1808-1885) and they moved to Indiana where their son Simon D. Hostetter was born in 1832. Simon is said to have been the first white child born in Noble County. With her daughter living on the Haw Patch it is easy to understand why Elizabeth would move to this area.

John Shover "Jack" Ramsby (1814-1898) was Elizabeth's second

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child. He married Hannah Reynolds on December 28, 1837. Hannah's sister, Mary, married Jack's brother Robinson Crusoe Ramsby (1823-1909). Jack (John) and Hannah would have 10 children who all lived to adulthood. Their fifth child, Alfred (1844-1936) was Craig Helman and his twin sisters, Tamra Gerber and Paula Yoder's great grandfather. And thanks to the painstaking scrapbooking work of Craig, Tamra, and Paula's late mother, Theda Lou, who was the only child of Homer and Elma Weaver Ramsby, we have a wealth of both family history and family photos.

John Shover Ramsby is mentioned in both the 1882 History of LaGrange County, Indiana and the LaGrange County Centennial History 1828-1928. The 1882 history (page 187) notes that "besides being a wealthy farmer, (he) has become noted as an admirer of the chase." It went on to say that, "Deer and bears in the early days, and foxes and coons of later years, furnished the sport. Bears, of course have long since gone. Thirty years ago, Mr. Ramsby captured three, but since then only a

straggler has now and then appeared."

We are left to wonder how John Stover found time for all that, given what the 1828-1928 history says about him (page 90). "Alvin Ramsby's father, J. S. Ramsby, being somewhat crippled and therefore unable to do any farm work, did teaming. He took grain of all kinds and beans to Fort Wayne for farmers and brought back supplies to such trade concerns as Benton, Waterford, Middlebury and Lima." We are left to wonder what caused him to be "somewhat crippled".


The Topeka Journal article of February 10, 1916, on the history of Eden Township quotes his daughter Harriet Ramsby Douglas and confirms his work as

a teamster. During hauling season Ramsby would make two trips a week to Ft. Wayne. He would leave home early on a Monday morning with a load of wheat, returning home after dark on Wednesday night. The following morning, he would leave again and get home late Saturday night. All that time traveling back and forth to Ft. Wayne didn't keep him from attending church. And this is where Craig's story, as told by his great grandfather Alvin Ramsby, continues.

"Father was very particular about his appearance on Sunday. When he was ready for church his daughter Har-

riet put a tablespoon of sweet cream in a saucer. Father dipped his fingers in the cream and rubbed it into his hair – for the shine.

"One year Spring was early and, with a heavy wood fire in Eden Chapel, by church time a few flies had hatched. The first requisite of all life is food. When church opened, the flies circulated and followed the sweet cream right to Father's hair.

"He would 'Amen' and swat from brow to the back of his neck with his left hand, and 'Amen' from the crown of his head to the ridge of his nose with his right hand. That was the most thor-

> oughly 'Amen-ed' sermon the preacher ever had!

"It also was Father's last time with sweet cream in his hair."


John Shover and Hannah Reynolds Ramsby and numerous members of the Ramsby family, including all 10 or their children, are buried in the Salem Cemetery a mile south of the LaGrange -Noble county line on the east side of State Road

5. Among them is Allen J. Ramsby, another son of John Shover. Allen was a member of the Ligonier Regulators, who captured the horse thief Gregory McDougal. McDougal was hung at Diamond Lake on Tuesday, January 26, 1858.

Of interest to the writer's wife: The four sons were named Allen, Alfred, Alvin, and Albert. Poor Hannah! You must wonder how she managed to get out the right name when


she called one of her boys, especially if he was being naughty!! ①

## Pioneer Donates Grain Bin Rescue Unit

Thanks to the generosity of Pioneer Seed Company and their local distributors, Mike and Justin Cunningham, the Topeka Volunteer Fire Department now has a valuable lifesaving tool. Paul Georgen, Pioneer Territory Manager from Plymouth, IN, along with the Cunninghams came to Topeka's Station 30 to present Fire Chief Stewart Bender with a check for \$5,000 on January 29th. The donation will cover all but \$300 of the cost of the Great Wall of Rescue grain bin rescue device.

"We are so grateful to Pioneer for a lifesaving tool like this, "Chief Bender commented, "and I hope that we never have to use it." While there are not many calls to rescue someone entrapped in a grain bin, when those calls do come, they present a high risk for both the victim and the first responder. Bender went on to say that training exercises are being planned for the 28 member department which serves a 110 square mile area in LaGrange and Noble counties.

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When Mike Cunningham, a Pioneer sales representative for 41 years, and his son Justin learned that Pioneer's parent company Corteva Agriscience offered a community grant program they went to work. "We appreciate this community and wanted to do something to help," Cunningham said. "Every (rural) fire department should have one of these."

The lightweight wall sections of Great Wall's design are easily maneuvered and can be aligned around the entrapped victim to form a tube, a wall, or other irregular shapes depending on the circumstance. Detachable steps can be inserted into each panel which allows the rescuer to use his own body weight to push the sections into the grain around the victim. Platforms were also included to provide a sturdy base for rescuers. One additional panel feature is a built-in auger that can move 1.5 bushels of grain per minute. Topeka was able to purchase 12 panels along with carrying bags that can easily be carried by two firemen. 🔒



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
