Five Steps When Taking A Risk

A few years ago, I walked across the Lake Michigan shoreline. As I approached a curve in the landscape, the only way to get to the other side was to walk on large rocks hugging the cliff. Alone and with a torn ACL, I was unsure about making it safely across the rocks. I walked cautiously, aware that any slip or misstep would immediately buckle my knee and I would be unable to get up. My strength would be gone. I had to choose whether to risk the unsure walk, or to turn around and forego the beauty on the other side of the coast.

I decided to take the risk.

Life presents us with similar situations. Have you ever had the chance to explore new experiences or opportunities, but you fail to take the risk because your handicaps, weaknesses, and insecurities hold you back? I have. Even the start of 2021 is full of uncertainty and risks after the year we have experienced in 2020. When you are confronted with scary, unknown next-step-options, you might feel insecure, minuscule, and ill-equipped. Fear paralyzes you. Uncertainty makes you to shrink back. You feel vulnerable when you are not equipped for what is ahead. If you have felt this way, you are not alone.

How can you move forward in life, or even 2021, when it's scary?

1. Seek God's wisdom and embrace

His strength. 1 Corinthians 1:25 says "For the foolishness of God is wiser than man's wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than man's strength." There's no greater wisdom than God's. If you are not religious, seek the wisdom of people you trust who have experienced life and have insight to share.

2. Tap into the strength you already have. Unsure situations make you feel out of place and insecure. Before



stepping out in rocky and unsure settings, spend time with people and places where your confidence is strengthened. When strengthened, you're ready to take the next step.

3. *Be prepared.* Ask questions, research, and prepare yourself as much as you can. Doing your homework gives you the best opportunity available.

4. Accept your insecurities. In any situation, most people aren't

fully knowledgeable or experienced. Experience comes through trial and error. Give yourself grace to not know it all. Then, see every opportunity as a teachable moment.

5. Look like you know what you're doing. I learned a lesson from a teacher with whom I once worked. He taught kids with cognitive disabilities. He told them that they were smart, and when they went anywhere in the school, they were to look "smart," so they wouldn't perpetuate the stereotype of being the "dumb" class. It's a valuable life lesson. The kids exuded a confidence like no other. So can you. Look like you know what you're doing and people will never know how scared you are.

Sometimes it's called "fake it until you make it."

No matter what's on the horizon for you, uncertainty is guaranteed. Risk might be involved. Whether it's a job, a relationship, a new business you're starting, or moving forward in your personal journey, there will be rocky places. Growth happens when you prepare, are honest with yourself, seek God, use your strengths, and put your best foot forward.

The opportunities on the other side are well worth the risk. Θ





Tips to Build Back Your Finances in 2021

Often times, January is a month of reflection on the previous year. 2020 was one of the most eventful years in recent memory. Many of us dealt with hardships and heartaches brought on by the pandemic. Some of us were riding in the front seat of an emotional and financial rollercoaster. Now that the holidays have come to a close, I challenge you to think about how you can improve your finances in 2021. A New Year means new beginnings and a fresh start. Here are a few financial tips to help you start off 2021 and financially get on track!

> 1. Build Back from your savings

Your Savings! 2020 was a tough year financially. You might have had to take money

more than you would have liked to make ends meet. Make 2021 the year where you build back your savings! To help you save more and spend less, ask yourself "Will this purchase make my life better?" If the answer is no, or if it will just add clutter to your home, then rethink the purchase! To help you save better, start small by doing things such as eliminating your morning coffee run and brewing a pot at home instead, preparing and cooking meals at home rather than getting take-out, or evaluating your cell phone plan and researching to see if there is a better bargain. I recommend that you take

the money that you would normally spend for these activities and place it in your saving account! You will be pleasantly surprised at how quickly your balance will grow! For example, if you spend \$4 every morning on coffee, you could have \$1,460 in savings by the end of the year!

2. Establish an Emergency Fund. This does not sound like fun because you cannot enjoy it. However, an emergency fund is one of the most important things that you can save for. This fund can help provide you with peace of mind. Knowing that if your car unexpectedly breaks down, you will have the money to pay for it and you will not have to dig yourself into a deeper financial hole by having to pay for the unexpected expense out-ofpocket! Living through a pandemic has made many of us think more about our emergency funds, am I right? What does yours look like?

3. Commit to Reducing Your Debt! Reducing your debt is like losing weight: it is difficult to do, but so satisfying when you accomplish your weight loss goal. If you have multiple credit cards, which one do you focus on first? Instead of focusing on the credit card with the highest balance, I recommend focusing on paying off the credit cards that have the highest interest rate first! Just like seeing pounds shed off, making small changes can start becoming a positive habit and can make it easier for you to continue with the program!

4. Understand Where Your Money Goes! If you track exactly where your

money is going, it will give you a better idea of where your overall financial picture stands. This will help you determine what areas you should cut to help trim your debt and increase your savings. A simple understanding of where your money is going can help reduce anxiety, which in turn can start to reduce financial stress. Last month, I provided several different ways applications can help you track spending (Mint, YNAB, etc.). Of course, there is still the old-fashioned paper and pencil method for those of you who prefer this way of tracking your spending!

5. Focus on Experiences Instead of "Things!" Rather than buying a new pair of shoes or an outfit, revisit all your options. What experience are you going to get from purchasing the new pair of shoes? You could sign up for a virtual cooking class, learn a new language, attend a group fitness class, register for an event, or go on a day-long or weekend road trip! These options will provide you with experiences, rather than "things." Some of these options still require spending money but focusing on experiences can help reduce stress and burnout while providing you with positive experiences.

The past year has been extremely stressful on a personal, professional, and financial level. How can you reduce your financial anxiety and get back on track to building back your finances better in 2021? 🚺





The Hawpatch History Detective -Investigative Updates

by Harold D. Gingerich

The Hawpatch History Detective has discovered some fascinating information related to several recent investigations that resulted in articles that were published in the Hometown Treasure. The "Tips Hotline" has been buzzing with information regarding Henry Elliott ('Twas a Purple Heart Christmas, December 2020) and Col. Louise A. Marshall (Louise Marshall: Topeka's First

Air Force Colonel, September 2020). One of the confidential informants is a 101-year-old Air Force veteran who served in World War II, the Korean Conflict, and who graduated from Topeka High School in 1936 at the age of 16.

Case #2020-9: Col. Louise A Marshall

The call came in at 6:30 pm on the evening of December 3, 2020. The screen on my cell phone simply said, "Unknown". Normally I would have just let it go to voicemail; after a while you get tired of answering all those "robo" calls. But for some reason I decided to answer... at the other end was a man who identified himself as Dave Lower. What followed was a 1 hour and 2-minute conversation, with him doing most of the talking. It did not take long for me to regret that I didn't know how to record the conversation.

At the age of 101, Dave Lower's mind is as clear and as sharp as the proverbial tack! The Lowers lived east of Topeka in Eddy, and while David attended school in Topeka, their mailing address was Rome City. One of their neighbors was Ashley Marshall, who told Lower numerous stories about being in World War I.

Ashley Marshall served in the trenches during World War I. "He told me that for six weeks they lived in the trenches and were gassed several times," Dave said. Marshall also told him that while they were digging the trenches, they unearthed the foot of a dead soldier that was sticking up out of the ground. Dave said, "Ashley told me that they didn't remove it, they just had to be careful as they walked around it!" Marshall survived the war and on July 20, 1919, he boarded the USS Roanoke in Brest, France for the voyage home.

"I remember Louise Marshall very well," Lower recalled, "we rode the school bus together when I was a senior and she was a first grader". Dave went on to recall that the boys on the bus really liked to tease Louise because "she was feisty and would fight back". It should be noted that, in addition to living to the age of 101, which is an accomplishment in itself, Dave Lower has also had a sorted military career. After graduating from Topeka High School in 1936 he attended Manchester College where he earned his degree in 1941. After working only one semester as an Athletic Director in a high school in southern Indiana, he received his draft notice and joined the Air Force on February 12, 1942.

Lower was sent to radio school. "I was a Second Lieutenant and they made me an OSS agent (pre C.I.A.). I was an 'internal spy'", he mused, "who does that to a 23-year-old kid?" He was given a supply of preaddressed stamped envelopes with a secret code inside the flap that he used to pass on information. During the Korean War, he was a Special Weapons Officer with the 452nd and had earned the rank of Major.

Dave Lower now lives in Wildomar, California.

Case #2020-12 PFC Henry B. Elliott: K.I.A.

There are still a few Topeka folks who remember Henry Elliott and his wife Arlene. Two of those are Phyllis Oesch Hartzler and Olive Oesch, both of whom were able to provide valuable bits of information. Phyllis was a first cousin to Arlene, Henry's wife. Their fathers were brothers. Olive Oesch was married to Arlene's younger brother, Billie. Phyllis remembers how shocked the community was at the news that Elliott had been killed in action. "Everybody knew him as Hank and everybody really like him, so we were all in shock."

Olive remembered that Hank drove a truck for Bill Miller at the grocery store, Millers Cash Grocery, which was an IGA, selling groceries and buying eggs from local farmers that could be sold in the store. What Olive remembers was the conflict with Henry's draft registration card. On the blank marked 'Employer' it clearly read "D.E. Seagly & Son". Both her memory and Henry's draft card may have been true; Henry may have worked for both employers.

There is a fascinating connection between William E. "Bill" Miller (1904-1992) and Henry Elliott. In Miller's obituary, among the survivors, was listed "stepbrother, George Elliott of Corfu, NY". George Elliott was a brother to Henry "Hank" Elliott. Their mother, Rosa Ann (Yoder) Elliott, had remarried after the death of her first husband. She married James "Elmer" Miller in October of 1922, who was a widower with several children, among whom were William and Francis. Both William "Bill", who married Delsie "Fern" Frey, and Francis, who married Evelyn Baker, were active members at the Maple Grove Mennonite Church in Topeka.

Report Summary: Both cases are still under active investigation. The hope is that new information will come in and that, once the COVID-19 pandemic is over, full case studies can be presented at future Topeka Area Historical Society meetings.

The following March he was appointed to a full-time position and was sworn in on April 6, 2020. "Ryan represented the Topeka Police Department well," observed Topeka Town Marshal Stan Strater, Jr., "especially with all the challenges that COVID-19 presented." One of this area's hidden gems is the family-owned County Line Bicycle Shop on the LaGrange-Elkhart county line at 5305 S 1200 W, Millersburg, IN. At their countryside shop, John and Dorothy Mullett have that new bike you have been looking for, or they can repair and tune-up your old reliable one. With almost 20 years in the business, County Line has earned the trust of a multitude of satisfied customers from across Elkhart, LaGrange, and Noble counties.

"I had no idea that the business would grow the way it has," John says. After 20 years in a factory putting on graphics for Dutchmen, and with a growing family, Mullett was looking for a way to supplement the family's income. Looking back, John recalls that, "I just wanted a side job where we could work together as a family and make a little extra."

John was raised one mile and a half west of LaGrange. Dorothy was

from the Topeka area and her last name was also Mullet, but with only one "t". John playfully chuckled and said, "I remind her that when we got married, she didn't lose anything; she just gained a little bit!" John and Dorothy were married on August 26, 1981. They have four sons, two daughters, and 20 grandchildren.

It was during the 12 years that the Mullett's were living in Honeyville, across from the feed mill, that the opportunity presented itself. Fry's Bicycle Shop, in Shipshewana, had opened a branch in Topeka, and one in Honeyville that was operated by Jr. Hostetler. During the summers of 1994, 1995, and 1996, John worked on bicycles as well as working full time in the factory. When Fry sold the bicycle business to Norman Miller. John's first cousin, and when Jr. Hostetler decided to move, the door opened for John and Dorothy to take over the Honeyville shop. Initially, John worked on a per-

centage basis.

From the beginning, it has been a true partnership and family business. "When my cousin asked us to take over the shop, I wasn't sure, but the boys seemed to really like it," John said, "and I thought it would be a good side job for us." And then, with a wide grin he added, "My wife does a lot in the shop, she builds almost all the new bikes. I tune them up, but she is the one who puts them together."

In the fall of 1997, John and Dorothy moved to their present location, but he continued to work at the Honeyville shop. When Miller decided to sell the business near the end of 2004, John and Dorothy purchased the Honeyville portion. They moved the bike shop to its present location and opened for business in February of 2005. They started off in a 40 x 60-foot shop that was a combination showroom and service area. Before long they enclosed a portion of the porch because they needed more space, but that was only a temporary solution. So, in 2018, they added a 40 x 40-foot addition to the building, complete with kitchen and a restroom.

"Today, we probably have six times the inventory as over when we started," John noted. County Line carries a wide variety of Fuji, Jamis, Bacchetta, and Sun bicycles, along with MillWood bicycle trailers. They also carry a large selection of accessories and reflective safety items. In addition to offering bikes and accessories, they also repair and service over 1,000 bikes a year.



The COVID-19 pandemic has had a positive effect on the bicycle industry. Many people outside the Amish community have a renewed interest in cycling. "Bikes are hard to get right now," according to John, "people need to plan ahead if they want a new bike." County Line does have a good supply in stock for people who are looking to buy a new bike for Christmas. But the Mullets are also planning ahead. This past June, County Line ordered a container of 265 new bikes which John hopes will arrive in January or early February.

County Line Bicycle Shop holds an annual Open House the third week of April. During that week all the family comes home to lend a hand. "The grandchildren can hardly wait for when we have an open house," John said, "they just love working here and meeting all the people."

The sincerity of John and Doro-

thy's Amish faith and heritage shines in their approach to the business. John was quick to point out both the blessing of God and how humbling it is to have the trust of others. "People come in to the shop and ask us, 'What bike they should get?' They are putting their trust in us and I don't want to ever break that trust! I keep telling my wife and the family that, "We just want to be here for the community and serve people...and, with the blessing of God, we can also make a living."

Stop in at County Line Bicycle Shop and see it for yourself. Make sure that you pick up one of their 2021 calendars. They are open Monday – Friday from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm and Saturday from 8:00 am until 12 noon. You can reach their voice mail at 574-642-9987 x2. Background: SARS-CoV-2 infection is transmitted predominately by respiratory droplets generated when people cough, sneeze, sing, talk, or breathe. 

Scholarship Opportunities

Graduating LaGrange County high school seniors who are looking for ways to support post-high school education have numerous opportunities available through their local community foundation. More than 45 one-time and several renewable scholarships are being offered through the LaGrange County Community Foundation (LCCF) to graduating students who are planning to pursue a full-time education at a college, university, technical or trade school. Students may apply online at LCCF.net/scholarships beginning December 1. The deadline to apply is Monday, Feb. 15, 2021, at 5 p.m.

Scholarship opportunities vary according to residency, career fields, current high school attendance, anticipated college enrollment, extracurricular involvement and academic performance. Applicants should read the criteria carefully, as each scholarship is unique. Scholarship awards range from \$400 to \$2,000, and may be used for educational expenses. A new 2021 scholarship, the Beverly J. Todd Memorial Scholarship (\$1000) was established to benefit a Prairie Heights graduating senior or a homeschool student pursuing a career in the education field.

Grants for Youth Programming

The LaGrange County Community Foundation (LCCF) is now accepting applications for its LIFE Grants program. LIFE Grants are available for educational and youth projects serving LaGrange County. These grants are made possible through the generosity of donors who have supported the LIFE funds at the Community Foundation.

LIFE is a youth philanthropy program of LCCF that provides an opportunity for young people to gain experience in community service and charitable giving. Members represent Lakeland, Westview, and Prairie Heights Schools. The students engage in a variety of community projects and provide oversight of the LIFE funds held at the community foundation.

LIFE seeks proposals for innovative or creative projects with significant impact on the youth community. A priority focus area of Health and Wellness has been established for the 2020-2021 school year. Nonprofit organizations serving LaGrange County youth, government agencies, and public schools are eligible to apply.

The Community Foundation will be conducting one funding round for the 2020-2021 school year. Grant applications will be **due January 5, 2021**. Impact Grants Awarded

The LaGrange County Community Foundation (LCCF) awarded \$21,920 in Community Impact Grants in November to five projects and programs benefiting LaGrange County.

Through its Community Impact Grant program, the foundation aims to support nonprofit needs and provide innovative programs and services in LaGrange County.

Ark Animal Rescue and Adoption received \$10,000 for the new roof at the Paws and Claws Bookstore in Howe. They were among five organizations who received funding this fall. The bookstore provides slightly used books to readers of all ages. All books sold are on a donation basis and all donations directly benefit the Ark Animal Rescue and Adoption.
