



# **Rebuilding Your Credit**

You cannot write your credit history, but you can rebuild it! Whether you have undergone a significant life event or filed for bankruptcy, reestablishing your credit rating takes time and discipline. It is helpful to create a plan that you can stick with. You will need to demonstrate that you can pay your bills on time every month and make regular repayments to a credit line.

Here are four ways you can begin to rebuild your financial credibility.

#### 1. Apply for a credit builder loan.

This is a short-term loan, usually no more than \$1,000, offered by banks and credit unions to consumers who want to boost their credit score. The money borrowed is deposited into an interest-bearing account but cannot be accessed until it has been repaid. Once the loan has been repaid, the financial institution sends a good report to the credit bureaus. At the end of the loan term, you receive the money and a better credit score. However, if you miss payments, it will also be reported.

#### 2. Use a secured credit card account.

This is a line of credit that is 50 to 100 percent of a cash savings deposit. For example, if you put \$500 in the account, you can charge up to \$500 on your secured card. If you consistently make your payments on time, it could be possible to transform your secured card into an unsecured card from a credit card issuer, boosting your credit score.

**Secured Card** – These are cards given to customers with bad credit or without credit. They require an initial deposit (usually equal to the credit limit) if cardholders cannot pay off their cards.

Unsecured Card - Most credit cards are unsecured, so there is no deposit required for cardholders to obtain one.

#### 3. Become an authorized user.

As an authorized user, you can make charges on someone else's credit card account using a credit card that bears your name. The card account history of the original cardholder will appear on your credit report, helping to improve your credit score.

#### 4. Make payments on time.

Even as you are tackling existing debt, make sure you do not add to it by missing credit card and loan payments. If you are not sure that you will make a minimum payment by the deadline, contact your creditors ahead of time

and explain your situation. Give them an estimate of when you will be able to repay your debt. If you let your creditors know in advance rather than skipping a payment, you will demonstrate responsibility and creditability. Creditors may be more likely to trust that you will pay them back.

Once you are on the right track again, be sure to create an emergency fund to deal with difficult, unforeseen financial situations. Building an emergency fund with three to six months of living expenses will enable you to cover many of the unexpected expenses you may face!

Confirm that your financial activity is reported to the three major credit bureaus—Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion—to ensure that your repayments are positively affecting your credit score. 0

# The DNA Journey Continues: Face-to-Face at Last

Earlier this year, in the February issue of The Hometown Treasure, "When The 'Someone' You've Heard About...Turns out to be You," I shared with you the adventure of discovery that began with a simple DNA test. Reader response was beyond anything I could have imagined. One lady called me to apologize because her relative (King Richard III) had beheaded my relative (Sir William Hastings) in the Tower of London. Many of you stopped me on the street or in the grocery store to tell me how much you had enjoyed the article. The conversations always ended with the exact words, "Oh, I hope you do another article after you have met your family face-to-face because I want to hear the story." Well, on Saturday morning, October 16, I met my sister LeAnn face-to-face for the first time in American Fork, Utah.

The journey of discovery began almost two years ago when my wife, Janice, convinced me to take the Ancestry DNA test. My mother had been adopted, and she had me before she married Dad (Joe Gingerich). Mom would never tell me about my birth father. I was "ok" with that because I loved my Eicher-Gingerich family and my Dad, who chose to adopt me. Besides, I always figured that I was a chapter in my birth father's life that needed to remain closed. However, not knowing my birth family left me totally at a loss when it came to medical history.

Little did we realize that one simple DNA test would lead us to where we are today. When the DNA results came back, Ancestry was able to link my lineage to Norway (41%), England (25%), Scotland (16%), Sweden (10%), as well as Ireland and Western Europe. And then, shared centimorgan matches started to appear on my Ancestry webpage.

My first challenge was to do a web search to find out what a centimorgan is. Centimorgans are genetic units of measure in our DNA that identify specific family genetics and settle paternity questions. My results eventually led me to the discovery of three half-sisters and a half-brother.

In the February article, I

shared the details of our initial emails and how I started having regular communication with my newly discovered half-sister, LeAnn, and her married daughter, Chantel, who live in Utah. COVID-19 restrictions made travel impossible, but LeAnn and I did have several Zoom calls. In-person face-to-face meetings were impossible until several weeks ago.

Janice's fifty-fifth Fredonia High School homecoming-class reunion in Southeast Kansas, over the weekend of October 9, provided the perfect opportunity for a road trip. Following the reunion, we spent a couple of days with Janice's sister and then made the two-day drive to Utah, checking into the hotel we had reserved for the weekend. Since having a long day of driving over the mountains, and my sister LeAnn had to work until 9

pm, we decided to wait and meet for breakfast in the morning.

When we arrived at the designated restaurant in the morning, the hostess was immediately ready to seat us. I said, "Well, we need to wait because we are meeting my newly discovered half-sister for the very first time." The hostess was overjoyed and almost burst into tears. It did not take her long to spread the word through the whole place about what was about to happen. I must confess that I was not prepared for the flood of emotions with our first face-to-face meeting. Fortunately, my wife Janice preserved it all on video. Numerous members of the restaurant staff found their way to our table to offer congratulations. And there were countless smiles and approving nods from our fellow patrons.

LeAnn had planned a special day for us. Following our two-hour breakfast, she took us to the beautiful Ashton Gardens in neighboring Lehi, UT, to see the magnificent sculptures of Light of the World Garden. That evening we had the joy of meeting LeAnn's daughter Chantel and her family, as well as LeAnn's son, Dustan, over dinner at a local Japanese hibachistyle restaurant.

Sunday evening LeAnn picked us up for the "Great Pumpkin Carving Contest" at Chantel's house, which has become an annual tradition. When LeAnn sent me a text message saying she was waiting for us in the hotel parking lot, I could not believe what I was reading. I had to read it aloud to Janice because it was word for word what I have said (texted) to people

I was picking up, "Your chariot awaits!" What are the chances of that—amazing! We had a great time; I even got in on the pumpkin carving.

As the evening ended, there was another emotional moment.

LeAnn's other daughter, Misty, who lives in San Antonio, TX, had sent a small package for me. Inside were two duplicate pictures of my birth father, Donald Copeland, one for me and one for LeAnn. There was also a handwritten two-page letter welcoming me to the family and a small hand towel with words printed on it reading "Every Family Has a Story WELCOME to Ours." I will admit it; my eyes more than welled up with tears.

Equally touching was when we went to leave, each of Chantel's children, including her nineteen-year-old son, gave us each a hug without being prompted. There are no words to describe the sense of acceptance and welcome that we felt.

The journey continued with a two-day drive to Yuma, Arizona, to visit our granddaughter Miriam and her husband, Josiah, who is a Marine. Spending several days in Yuma provided the perfect opportunity for a day trip (two and a half hours) to Alpine, California, to meet my aunt Delores Kling and Norman, her husband of sixty-three years. Uncle Norm fired up the Model T he had personally restored and drove us to a local Mexican restaurant for a fabulous lunch, and then gave us a tour of Alpine.

Aunt Delores was only six or seven years old when she knew my mother, Shirley. But Delores had family pictures, stories to tell, and a wealth of family history to share. One of the many interesting stories had to do with my ninth great-grandmother, Rebecca Towne Nurse (1621-1692). According to the family's version, Rebecca was an herbalist, and one day

the neighbor's pig got into her garden. She yelled at the pig, which then fell over dead. They convicted her as a witch; she was one of the first to be hung in the infamous Salem Witch Trials. Arthur Miller's well-known play, *The Crucible*, is about her trial.

As of this writing, there has been no communication with my other half-sisters and brother. We have communicated with Aunt Delores and Uncle Norm's daughter, who has family in Indiana, through her husband. She plans a road trip to Indiana within the next year, so we plan to meet her then. And we will most definitely stay in touch with LeAnn and her family.

At so many points along the way on this journey of discovery, I have been reminded of the sovereign grace of God. It has been exciting to discover the family I never knew. But PRAISE GOD for the Eicher family that adopted my mother as a baby and then welcomed me into the world as a child born out of wedlock. They poured God's Word into me; I would not be the man I am today without them. And then for Joe Gingerich, who married my mother and got me as part of the package. He adopted me and loved me and will forever be "Dad."

While the next steps in this journey are not clear—I promise to keep you posted. ()

In 1992, he married Brenda, who had grown up in Florida, about three miles east of Pinecraft. Dave says that the move back to Indiana was at Brenda's urging. The Millers moved north into a trailer on a four-acre tract, which they purchased from Dave's father, Wilbur. That trailer would be their home for the next ten years.

When they first arrived in Indiana, Dave got a job operating a bulldozer. But to supplement the family's income, he started tilling gardens, rolling lawns, and doing some seeding. By the fall of 1993, Dave's Seeding Service was up and running, specializing in seeding lawns.

The timing could not have been better because local construction began to boom and, along with it,

Miller's business. Consumers began requesting more services than just the seeding of lawns. In 1995, Maynard began working for his brother and within a couple of years became a partner. With the company's continued growth also came a name change to Dave's Lawnscaping. In 2017, Dave and Brenda's son, Jed, who had worked in the family business growing up, came on board full time.

Farmview Landscaping Center was added in the year 2000. Several factors influenced the Miller brothers' decision to expand. "We felt like there was a need for a lot of those 'do it yourself' homeowners, so why not create a place out there in the country near Topeka where they could buy what they need," Dave said. "And Dad needed something to do!" he chuckled. The elder Miller

had recently retired from farming. The other factor was that the new location would allow the brothers to save money by buying and stockpiling landscaping materials in larger quantities. The landscaping center was constructed on the four acres Dave had purchased from his father years earlier. A small store and several greenhouses provide space where customers can buy a wide variety of plants, fertilizer, trees and shrubs, bag and bulk mulch, and landscaping stones.

When you talk individually with Wilbur, Dave, or Maynard, it does not take long for each of them to bring up the subject of working together. "It doesn't get any better than this," beams Dave, "I hope my sons will help too, in fact, they are." The extended family, including their

four sisters, get to hear about what is going on when they get together every month for a meal. "Believe you me, my sisters have to listen to all the stories from Dad, me, and my brother!"

The business continues to grow, with 85% of its work being residential. Miller is quick to give credit to his dad, brother, their employees, and community support for the business's success.

One of the sources of satisfaction for Dave has been the development of many of their young workers. "To see them come in as skinny as a rail and then in a couple of years fill out and take responsibility as adults is pretty cool!" Another area of satisfaction has been sitting down to dream and plan with homeowners, whether it is a landscaping project or an outdoor kitchen.

It is not too early to 'Think Spring'! is the phrase on their Hometown Treasure ad. Jed said, "People should start thinking about their landscaping project now, and then come talk with us at the Midwest Home and Yard Show that will be held at the MEC in February.
