## In-person and Remote Participation

The thirteenth annual Paddle for Parkview is back this summer with an in-person celebration event after two years as a strictly virtual event due to the pandemic.

On Friday, June 10, Paddle for Parkview enthusiasts and sponsors are invited to attend a celebration event at noon at Trading Post Canoe, Kayak and Campground, 7525E 300N, Mongo, Indiana. Paddlers have the option to get out on the beautiful Pigeon River that day-following the short program and box lunch-or they can register online to paddle at their convenience anytime Monday-Friday, 9 am-3 pm, between July 25 and August 5. Event T-shirts will be provided to paddlers who register before May 25. Pre-registration for the June 10 event, and for paddling times between July 25 and August 5, is required-visit Parkview.com/LaGrangePaddle. With both in-person and remote participation, Paddle for Parkview
encourages as many people as possible to enjoy a fun, relaxing afternoon on the water with family or friends while supporting the work of the Parkview LaGrange Foundation. This year's event offers two paddling options: a more leisurely seven-mile route at $\$ 40$ per person-and a thirteen-mile route at $\$ 50$ per person.

We also offer monthly free QPR training classes for the public, to help area residents recognize the signs when someone may be contemplating suicide and equip them to support that person and refer them to compassionate help from mental health professionals."

## High Blood Pressure: What Do I Need to Know?

High blood pressure is a common condition, and it is important to understand how to manage it to stay healthy! Almost 50 percent of adults have high blood pressure. You may also hear it called hypertension, which is the medical word for high blood pressure.

## What is blood pressure?

Blood pressure refers to how much your blood pushes on the walls of the vessels that carry blood from your heart to other parts of your body, including important organs like your kidneys.

Why is high blood pressure bad?
When your blood pressure is high, your heart has to work harder to get blood where it needs to go in your body. Over time, this stress leads to a higher risk of heart attack, stroke, heart failure, and kidney problems.

What will I feel if my blood pressure is high?

Most people do not have any symptoms when their blood pressure is consistently high, even though this has serious consequences. This is why monitoring is so important! In adults over forty without high blood pressure, it is recommended that blood pressure is checked at least once a year. Some risk
factors for high

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blood pressure include: increasing age, being overweight, family with high blood pressure, high salt diet, inactive lifestyle, drinking alcohol, and smoking. For people who have high blood pressure, it is recommended to check blood pressure daily.

## How is high blood pressure treated?

High blood pressure is treated with lifestyle changes and medications. Some examples of lifestyle changes that can lower blood pressure are: changing your diet, reducing the amount of salt you eat, exercising, maintaining a healthy weight, stopping smoking, and reducing alcohol intake. Additionally, you need to discuss with your doctor the many safe medications that can control your blood pressure. High blood pressure is a chronic condition, which means that it will need to be monitored and managed for the rest of your life.

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## esse Huntsman

Free Thinker and Van Buren Township Pioneer

History is filled with forgotten people whose only wish was to raise their families and live their lives according to the dictates of their hearts. One of those forgotten people is Jesse Huntsman, one of the first settlers of Van Buren Township. He would later play a prominent role in the formation of Springfield Township. He was also a member of a group of freethinkers who attempted to build a new social order between 1843 and 1848.

The name of Jesse Huntsman is referenced at least ten times in the 1882 History of LaGrange County Indiana. R.H. Rerick, in his chapter on Van Buren Township writes, "The first comers, so far as known, were Jesse Huntsman, who took possession of the only piece of prairie land in the township in 1829, before the land was on the market, and Nehemiah Coldren, who in the same year built the first log house,
near the bridge over Crooked Creek" (page 173). The phrase, "before the land was on the market," raises some interesting questions. Was Huntsman a homesteader, or was he a squatter? How could he lay claim to land that did not belong to him?

A Patchwork Sampler, published by the Shipshewana Area Historical Society, provides some important local historical information (pages 2-4). On the national level, Thomas Jefferson's Louisiana Purchase in 1803 doubled the size of the United States. The problem was that the nation was still burdened by huge war debts from both the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812. The sale of land in the Northwest Territory-of which Indiana was a part—was a much needed source of revenue. But how do you acquire the legal title to the millions of acres of


Indian land in the west?
The Harrison Land Act of 1785 set the price of public land at two dollars an acre with a minimum purchase of 320 acres. The Land Act of 1804 reduced the minimum acreage to 160 acres with half the purchase price upfront and the balance paid in installments. This meant that most settlers were still priced out of the market. It was only the speculators who could afford to buy land. The Land Act of 1820 sought to level the playing field for the settlers by reducing the price of public land to one dollar and twenty-five cents an acre with a minimum purchase of only eighty acres.

Between 1818 and 1837, in a series of treaties, the Potawatomi ceded much of their land in Indiana to the federal government. In a landmark decision in 1823, the Supreme Court ruled that Indians could occupy lands within the United States but could not hold title to those lands. The Court ruled that their "right of occupancy" was subordinate to the United States' "right of discovery".

Even before government surveys were made, land speculators and settlers began arriving in Indiana looking to lay claim to cheap public land. In Indiana alone, the sale of public land grew from 1.9 million acres between 1820 and 1830 , to over five million

nite people in southern Michigan hid them.

Jesse Huntsman was born on October 21, 1804, in Nottingham, Pennsylvania, near the Maryland border. He married Lucy Jones (1813-1860) in Knox, Ohio, on February 16, 1826. If sources such as Ancestry and Find a Grave are correct, Lucy would have only been thirteen or fourteen years old when she married Jesse. Their daughter, Rosanna, was born in July of 1828. In 1831 they moved to the Mongo area. Their son, Phineas, born on December
acres between 1830 and 1837. The states population swelled from a mere 148,000 in 1820 to 686,000 by 1840.

Jesse Huntsman was among those early settlers who came to Indiana. Leaving Ohio, he settled in Van Buren Township laying claim to land that had yet to be officially surveyed. There is at least one surviving certificate of land purchase, signed on behalf of Andrew Jackson, with Huntsman's name on it that appears to have been signed in 1834.

One year after taking office, President Andrew Jackson signed the Indian Removal Act on May 28, 1830. This authorized the president to grant lands west of the Mississippi in exchange for Indian lands with the existing states. That led to the Potawatomi Trail of Death and the Cherokee Trail of Tears where native Americans were forcibly removed from their lands. Chief Shipshewana was among the 876 men, women and children forced to walk 665 miles over sixty-one days to Kansas in 1838. It is worth noting that the family of Topeka resident Charlie Collyer, whose forebears were members of the Potawatomi tribe, escaped the Trail of Death because Amish Menno-

29,1832 , is reported to have been the first white male born in Springfield Township (LaGrange County Centennial History 1828-1928, page 92). Jesse and Lucy would have at least six children, most of whom did not survive to adulthood.

According to the 1882 History LaGrange County, Indiana (page 368), Jesse, who was among a group of freethinkers, played an active role in the organization of the township and the LaGrange Phalanx. The Phalanx (Association) was a group of about thirty freethinking families that experimented with communal living between 1843 and 1848. They are reported to have been active in the Underground Railroad, giving aid to escaping slaves

en route to Canada. They also stood for the equality of women in a time when that was politically unpopular.

At its height, the group numbered 120 men, women, and children. They lived together in a 210 -foot-long building that was twenty-four feet wide located east of what is now the intersection of State Road 3 and US 20. There was a common dinner room, a school room, and dormitory rooms for individual families. The group farmed over 1,000 acres, operated smoke houses, grist mills, tanneries, and lumber operations. While it was always profitable, the group ultimately disbanded because of personal differences that arose within the members.

When the association disbanded, Huntsman's share was a homestead farm of 220 acres in Sections 20 and 21. Following the death of his parents in 1860, Phineas purchased the family farm. On January 1, 1863, Phineas married Orissa Jennings (1832-1912) who had moved to the township with her parents in 1854. Phineas' name appears on the 1874 Springfield Township map.

Lucy Jones Huntsman died on June 5, 1860. Six months later Jesse died on December 24. They are buried in the Rogers Cemetery on N. CR 750 East, north of Brushy Prairie. Five of their children-Rosanna (1828-1839), Simeon (1840-1842), Mary (18421862), Julia (1845-1847), and Alice (1852-1856) —were also laid to rest in the Rogers Cemetery. Phineas and Orissa Huntsman are buried in the Greenwood Cemetery in LaGrange. (1)
