Wild Horse and Burro Adoption

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is holding a wild horse and burro placement event May 13–14, at Red Horse Ranch, 64247 Library Road, Cassopolis, Michigan. Approximately sixty animals gathered from western rangelands will be offered. The BLM has placed more than 240,000 wild horses and burros into private care since 1971.

Adoptions and sales will be held by appointment only from 8 a.m.–5 p.m. on Friday, May 13 and from 8 a.m.–1 p.m. on Saturday, May 14. On both days, placements will occur in one-hour increments with five appointments per hour. Appointments can be made via email at *BLM_ES_NSDO_ WHB@blm.gov*. The BLM requests all potential buyers and adopters to disclose their top three preferred times slots when making appointments.

The BLM's Adoption Incentive Program was designed to help improve rangeland health in overpopulated herd management areas in the western states and to save taxpayer costs for animals held at off-range holding facilities. Through this program, qualified adopters are eligible to receive \$1000 after one year of issuance of the certificate of title for an untrained wild horse or burro. The incentive is available for all untrained animals eligible for adoption with an adoption fee of \$125 per animal.

- Any non-prescription products.



What should be used in a nebulizer?

Common medications that may be prescribed by a doctor to use in a nebulizer are:

- Albuterol (Proventil or AccuNeb).
- Formoterol (Perforomist).
- Budesonide (Pulmicort Resupules).
- Ipratropium (Atrovent).
- Ipatropium/albuterol (DuoNeb).

When should a diffuser be used?

A diffuser is meant to spread essential oils around a room. These products should not be inhaled directly by a person. You may have heard from friends or family that using essential oils, also known as aromatherapy, has many benefits, and now you want to try using them. If this is you—a diffuser is what you are looking for! There are a couple things to share with you to make sure you will be able to use a diffuser safely. Diffusers should be used in a room with good ventilation. Also, doctors recommend only using diffusers for thirty to sixty minutes. Using these machines for longer periods of time may cause headaches. Following these instructions will ensure safe use of a diffuser.





Finding Your Room It is Really Easier Than You Think

It is gratifying to be stopped on the street, or in a store, and be told by people how much they enjoy reading my monthly historic articles in *The Hometown Treasure*. But there is one question that I get asked repeatedly. "Where do you find all of that stuff— I'd like to know my family's history, but I wouldn't know where to begin." My normal response to that question is, "I don't know . . . I just find stuff!" The truth is that I do know. Clearly it is time to share the secrets, not the least of which is having a monthly publication deadline that forces me to come by Harold D. Gingerich up with something. So, here is where I

start my journey.

The best place to start is with a moment of honesty. Let us face it, I am probably a little ADD and Obsessive Compulsive. But, if you have been reading my monthly articles for very long, you have figured that out already. My family certainly has. I find something—it turns over and over again in my brain—I just have to figure it out. The problem is that one discovery leads to another, which leads to another, and on it goes. A great example of that relates to my newly discovered family.



It started with a simple DNA test. There are several companies like Ancestry and 23andMe who offer the service for under \$100. I waited until the test was on sale to take the plunge. A couple of times a year Ancestry offers a half-price sale. When my results came back, I started getting possible DNA matches of people who might be relatives.

In the February 2021 issue of *The Hometown Treasure*, I shared the story of how I discovered a family that I did not know I had. The following December, I shared the story of meeting my sister, LeAnn, and some of her family in Utah. I also met as my aunt, Delores, and her husband, Norm, in California, face to face for the first time. Aunt Delores told us that Rebecca Towne Nurse, the first woman to be hung during the Salem Witch Trials, was my sixth or seventh great-grandmother.

That was all it took . . . I just had to figure this out! Where did she fit into my family tree? I admit it, I obsessed over finding out. It took a while, but along with help from my wife, Janice, we figured it out over the weekend of April 3. But that was not the end. To date, we have traced the family back to King Edward I of England (1272-1307), to King Philip III of France (1245-1285), and to Charlemagne (747-814), the first emperor of the Holy Roman Empire. There was even a Roman senator. To tell the truth, I am still hoping to find Julius Caesar and not the emperor Nero. Thus far, I have taken one line of my family back to about 385 AD to a man named Chlodio.


I know it is crazy, but it is not as hard as it sounds. It just takes time and patience. You really can find anything on the Internet. You just have to start looking and know how to cross-check the information you are uncovering. If an old guy like me can do it, so can you.

Start by downloading a free family tree form. I personally use the six generation pedigree chart by Misbach Enterprises. Once you download the form, print several copies to work with. I generally use the backs of scrap paper. I do not want to put it into digital form until I am pretty sure that I have my information correct.

Once you have printed the form, start filling in the blanks with the information you already know. Talk to older family members to see what you can learn from them. I also look to see what is on the Internet about deceased family members on free websites like Find a Grave. You can also go online to look for death certificates and obituaries, many of which contain a wealth of information, including parents' names and place of birth. It is amazing what pops up by doing a simple online search of your family member.

There are two subscription websites that I use with great regularity. Those are Ancestry.com and Newspapers.com. Both are subscription based, so if cost is a factor and you can only afford one, go with Ancestry. You can create your own, searchable family tree on their website. When you do a search on an individual, the website frequently will bring up marriage records, military records, pictures, and death certificates. In addition to that, Ancestry offers you hints about people you have placed on your family tree. You can even print copies of your family tree. For amateur genealogists, it is a gold mine because so much of the work has already been done for you.

So, here is the way I do things. Once I have verified the information about a newly discovered family member on my paper copy, I upload it to my **6 Generation Pedigree Chart**



Ancestry family tree. Verifying your information is critical. While this article is not intended to be an advertisement for Ancestry, I like their website because it gives you an opportunity to compare your information with family trees of other people who share your relative.

Once I discovered royalty in my ancestral tree—someone with "Sir" or "Lady" in front of their name—I started doing online searches on them individually. When you find a knight, a duke, a duchess, or better yet, a king, be ready for your heart rate to increase. But make sure you have your blank family tree form and a good supply of scrap paper to take notes as you research.

When you do your online search on someone of notoriety, the first thing to come up is generally Wikipedia. Wikipedia is an online encyclopedia. You do need to be careful because anyone can post information to Wikipedia. That information may or may not be accurate. That is why I like to verify the information from as many sources as possible, especially if it relates to people of historical significance.

One of the great things about

that help you discover even more of your ancestors. When I did a online search on my—how many ever greats-grandfather, Sir John Holland, Duke of Exeter, I discovered his father's name, Thomas Holland, was highlighted in blue. All I had to do was click on his name. That took me to Thomas's page where I discovered, among other things, that Thomas had secretly married 12-year-old "Joan, the Fair Maiden of Kent" who was Sir John's mother. The names of Thomas' parents were also listed, so that allowed me to trace the family back even farther.

So now you know my secrets. It is time for you get started. But I must warn you, it can be highly addictive. Oh, and do not be surprised when you find that you are also related to Charlemagne.
